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

School Selection Process

for the 2025-2026 School Year

The School District of Philadelphia's Find Your Fit school selection process allows students currently in pre-kindergarten through 11th grade to apply to attend any District school, with available space, outside of their neighborhood or catchment area for the following school year. The *Find Your Fit* school selection process for the 2025-2026 school year opens on September 13, 2024 at 4:00 pm and closes on October 23, 2024 at 11:59 pm.


During the 2023-2024 school year, the School District continued to receive input from students and families regarding improvements to the school selection process. As a result, the Offices of Student Enrollment and Placement (OSEP) and Information Technology (IT) collaborated with a new technology provider, Avela, to make several changes based on that input. The newly updated school selection system will provide a more streamlined application process. **On August 5, the District launched a more user-friendly school search tool, called Explore, that provides comprehensive information about each school.** Here is what students and families who plan to participate in the school selection process for the 2025-2026 school year can expect when the application opens this fall:

- In the new school selection system, each applicant will be able to rank their top five school/program choices – a critically important update. In previous years, eligibility and seats available were considered almost exclusively. This new system uses a Nobel Prize-winning algorithm that is designed to generate the best offer based on both an applicant's eligibility <u>and</u> their preference based on how they ranked their school choices. It is important to remember to choose a total of 5 schools. Limiting options will not improve the chances of receiving an offer – in fact, the chances will decrease.
- Applicants may receive either one offer or zero offers during the initial response phase. Offers will be made based on the order in which an applicant ranked their five schools, the applicant's eligibility, and seats available at the school/program.

- Applicants will remain on the waitlist only for higher ranked schools to which they did not receive an offer. For example, if a student ranked five schools and received an offer to their 3rd ranked school, they will remain on the waitlist for their 1st and 2nd ranked schools, but would be automatically declined for a seat at their 4th and 5th ranked schools. If they subsequently receive a waitlist offer for their 2nd choice, they can accept that offer which would automatically decline the original offer at their third choice but allow them to remain on the waitlist for their 1st choice. They could later accept a seat at their first choice, if offered.
- Zip code preference is still considered, but the zip codes have changed slightly. The six zip codes are **19140**, **19133**, **19132**, **19136**, **19124**, **and 19134**.
- While assessment information, including the PSSA, is still required to obtain seats at criteria-based schools, the application system will no longer accept Pennsylvania Alternate System of Assessment (PASA) as an approved standardized assessment.

The District is excited about these updates to the *Find Your Fit* school selection process. The new system is designed to better account for student preference, provide more students with an initial offer, facilitate more acceptances in a shorter amount of time, and result in an overall reduction in the time it will take to fill open seats across all schools.

The District will provide more detailed information about the *Find Your Fit* school selection process, including timelines, criteria, and helpful resources, in the fall. In the meantime, students and families are invited to find answers to questions they may have and learn more about school selection by visiting <u>schoolselect.philasd.org</u>.



English Learners

Office of Multilingual Curriculum and Programs

Currently, more than 24,000 English Learners (ELs) representing over 130 countries who speak more than 100+ home languages are enrolled in the School District of Philadelphia. The Office of Multilingual Curriculum and Programs (OMCP) oversees and supports the District's Language Instruction Educational Program (LIEP). There are three distinct LIEPs designed to meet the needs of multilingual learners:

ESL (English as a Second Language)

The ESL program helps English Learners (ELs) improve their English language proficiency and content knowledge.

Examples of what ESL program support might look like:

- An ESL teacher leading the instruction
- An ESL teacher joining a general education classroom in order to offer additional supports

Newcomer Learning Academy (NLA)

The Newcomer Learner Academy (NLA) provides an accelerated course of study that builds social and academic English for students ages 14 - 21 who recently arrived to the United States.

The program is designed to meet the needs of high school students new to the U.S. and demonstrate beginning levels of English language proficiency (i.e., 1.0-1.9). Through courses that embed literacy and language learning with content instruction in mathematics, science, and social studies, students develop English language and literacy skills while acquiring content-area skills and knowledge. With appropriate and sufficient scaffolds and support, students are expected to learn standards-based content and actively participate in their learning. For students with interruptions or gaps in formal education—SLIFEs (Students with Limited or Interrupted Formal Education)—additional support is provided through specialized coursework in literacy

Dual Language Programs

Academic programs that are taught in two languages. Any program that provides literacy and content instruction through two languages and that promotes bilingualism and biliteracy, grade level academic achievement, and multicultural competence for all students. These programs aim to ensure that English Learners at all levels of language proficiency can fully engage in rigorous grade-level content, meet grade-level standards, and participate in instructional programs with equal access to educational opportunities and extracurricular activities, consistent with federal and state laws and regulations. OMCP supports all schools in meeting the needs of English and Dual Language Learners through clear instructional guidance, consistent advocacy, strong leadership, and close collaboration with all stakeholders.

Special Education Services and Supports

Office of Specialized Services

The School District of Philadelphia provides an extensive range of educational services and supports for students with diverse needs within our schools. In compliance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and the Pennsylvania State Board of Education Regulations, the District provides an appropriate educational program designed to meet each student's unique needs and to support academic, social and emotional growth. The School District of Philadelphia is continually working to increase its capacity to serve a wider range of student needs within its public schools.

These services* include:

Learning support – for children whose greatest need of support is in the areas of reading, writing, math, or speaking or listening related to academics.

Emotional support – for children whose greatest need is for social, emotional, and behavioral help.

Life skills support – for children whose greatest need is to learn academic, functional, or vocational skills that will allow them to live and work independently.

Blind and visually impaired support – for children who require services related to visual impairments or blindness. The IEP for these students must address the extent to which Braille will be taught and used.

Deaf and hard of hearing support – for children who require services related to deafness or hearing impairment. The IEP for these students must include a communication plan to address language and communication needs.

Speech and language support – for children who have speech and language impairments and require services to develop communication skills.

Physical support – for children who have a physical disability and require services in functional motor skill development.

Autistic support – for children with autism who require services in the areas of communication, social skills, or behavior.

Multiple disabilities support – for children with more than one disability, the combination of which results in severe impairment, and who require services in academic, functional, or vocational skills necessary for independent living. *Speech/language therapy, occupational therapy, physical therapy, hearing support, vision therapy, and transition services also are provided to eligible students requiring these related services.

A broad array of supplementary aids and services to support students' needs includes communication devices, assistive technology, and pre-vocational opportunities.

The Office of Specialized Services works within The Office of Academic Supports and alongside other school district departments to support the appropriate implementation of programs for students with disabilities. Individualized Review (Formerly LeGare)

For students who have a support IEP, 504 Plan, or are an English Language Learner, they automatically qualify for LeGare. This is an advocacy process that allows students an EQUAL opportunity to apply and attend a criteria-based High School. This advocacy process is only applicable to 8th graders who are headed into 9th grade.

Please understand that LeGare does not guarantee admission into a criteria-based High School. Students who qualify for LeGare must still meet or come close to the admissions criteria of the criteria-based School and the school must be able to provide reasonable accommodations for the student to be successful—all without substantially altering the way the curriculum is delivered at the school. Also, it is important to make sure the criteria-based High School you are applying to is the right fit for your student.

Academic and Specialty Programs

Advanced Placement

Advanced Placement (AP) courses were created to provide students with a pathway to earn college credits while in high school. These rigorous college level courses help students develop critical thinking skills, scholarly writing, and time management. Students enrolled in AP courses have the ability to earn college credits if they score a 3 or higher on AP exams.

All-Academy High Schools

The School District operates two All Academy High Schools, Abraham Lincoln and Roxborough High Schools. These two schools enroll every student into their choice of a Career Academy, which may be a Career and Technical Education (CTE program) or a Career Themed Academy. Students are prepared for both college entrance, as well as the possibility of beginning their careers upon graduation from high school.

What Are Career Academies?

Career academies are small, personalized learning communities within a high school. Students enter the academy through a voluntary process; they choose which academy they wish to participate in with parental knowledge and support. Students in a career academy take a mixture of career (usually one or two) and academic (usually three or four) classes each year. Classes meet entrance requirements for four-year universities. Students develop knowledge in a given career pathway, and—in most academies— have opportunities to earn industry certification relevant to the career academy. A career academy involves teachers from different subjects working together as a team. Staff teams, who often share common planning time, work together to implement the key features of the academy. Students may be grouped together for several periods every day with a core group of teachers. This promotes a family-like atmosphere and results in close studentteacher ties.

A career academy includes the following essential elements:

- A small learning community supported by a local advisory committee
- A career theme that includes a college-prep curriculum and lead to industry certification
- Partnerships with employers, the community, and higher education

By design, these three central elements of a career academy lead to a school that is rigorous and relevant.

Career & Technical Education (CTE)

Programs of Study

About Career & Technical Education (CTE)

Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs are one-, two-, or three-year programs of study that students enroll in as part of their high school career. Students study the specific technical theories, competencies, and skills that have been identified by industry advisors and are taught in state of the art facilities that reflect current technology and equipment used in business and industry. While enrolled in CTE programs, students also engage in a college preparatory academic curriculum. Upon graduation, students are prepared to transition to postsecondary educational opportunities (college, university, technical school and apprenticeship programs), and equipped with industry knowledge, credentials and certifications that enable them to begin their career pathway in multiple settings. Current programs offered to School District of Philadelphia high school students are described below. More information is available at https://www.philasd.org/cte/.

Accounting

This instructional program is designed to prepare students to provide technical administrative support and explore a career in accounting and/or financial management. Students learn to use generally accepted accounting principles through the use of computerized accounting formats to complete the steps of the accounting cycle for various forms of business ownership; verify and enter details of transactions from source documents into journals; post transactions to accounts; summarize details of separate ledgers by transferring data to general ledgers; balance records and compile various financial statements and reports; prepare withholding, social security, and other tax reports. Accounting students volunteer at tax sites during tax season.

Animal Sciences

Students focus on the sciences behind animal production and health, through regular hands-on activities with a range of species—large and small. Small animal instruction will focus on veterinary science skills related to lab and companion (pet) species, while much of the students' large animal (cows, sheep, horses and pigs) competence will be based on time spent on the working farm which is part of the school's campus. Education in animal science prepares students for opportunities in such areas as animal behavior & breeding, food and fiber production, nutrition, animal agribusiness, animal welfare, veterinary technology, research, and biotechnology.

Architectural Drafting and Design

This instructional program prepares students to apply technical knowledge and understanding of scientific principles, mathematical concepts and communicative and technical skills, including CAD, combined with laboratory experiences, which are supportive to the architect and the architectural engineer. This subject matter is concerned with developing plans for buildings and other structures using various building materials and creative layouts and designs that are in keeping with the various building codes, zoning laws and other regulations and ordinances. The resulting effort must be in keeping with cost limitations as well as the client's preference to the style and plan with emphasis on the art form. The worker assists the architect in inspections to make certain that the design is not altered and that the materials used agree with contract specifications, primarily in the field of building construction.

Autobody Collision & Repair

Students learn to examine damaged vehicles and estimate the cost of repairs. Following industry recognized I-CAR procedures, they learn to repair dents; remove and replace damaged fenders, panels, grills, and bumper assemblies. Also learned is the replacement or repair of upholstery, accessories, electrical and hydraulic window and seat operating equipment, and glass. Theory includes vehicle design and construction, structural straightening, surface preparation, safety and restraint systems, and use of power and hand tools. Basic welding techniques of Mig, spot, and plastic are also taught. Students refinish repaired surfaces in a paint booth and learn to apply primer, finish, and clear coats of paint. Students will practice hands-on color sanding, polishing, cleaning and detailing techniques.

Automotive Technology

This instructional program prepares students to apply technical knowledge and skills in repairing and maintaining all types of automobiles and light trucks. Hands-on practice includes safety rules, use of personal protective equipment, professional shop practices and use of hand and power tools. This program includes instruction in vehicle diagnosis and testing of malfunctions and the repair fuel, electrical, cooling, and brake systems. Also taught are the operation and repair of engines, drive trains, and the steering and suspension systems. Students learn the use of technical repair information and industry standard tools and resources.

Baking & Pastry Arts

Baking and pastry arts programs provide students with practical hands-on experience and basic theoretical training in desserts, pastries, candies, decorative work, specialty or artisan breads, high volume production and food marketing. A students' career path may also include cruise ship buffets, resort banquets, candy production, special occasion and wedding cake decorating, restaurant production of desserts and breads, chocolate artistry, buffet and plated desserts, classical and European pastries, pastry showpieces and competition pastries.

Barbering

This instructional program prepares individuals to shave and trim facial/neck hair and beards, cut and dress hair, fit hairpieces, give facial and scalp massages, apply skin treatments, and to prepare for licensure as professional barbers. Instruction includes facialshaving; beard and mustache shaping and trimming; shampooin g; hair cutting; hairstyles and styling art; facial treatments and massage; chemical applications; hair and scalp anatomy and physiology; hairpiece and toupee fitting; equipment operation; health and safety; customer service; and shop business practices. Salon and product management, including record keeping and customer relations, is a focus of the curriculum. Students also receive instruction in providing services to chronically ill and special needs clients and explore potential careers in the Health Industry. To adequately prepare students for employment in this industry, these programs adhere to all ethical and professional standards of the industry, as mandated by the PA State Board of Barber Examiners. Under the supervision of a licensed and credentialed instructor, students participate in the operation of a school-based barbershop and cater to real clients to gain the customer service and management skills required to become gualified professionals in this exciting industry. In addition, students intern in barbershops to gain valuable on-the-job training and experience. Instruction is designed to qualify students for the PA State Board of Barber Examiners licensing examination.

Biotechnology

Students in this program will learn how the tools and techniques of science are used to help improve our lives and the health of our planet. Students will explore genetics, microbiology, DNA structure and function, forensics, bioethics, and instrumentation through hands-on, realworld labs, and experiments. Skills covered will range from preparing solutions and using transfer pipets to cutting edge techniques in cell culturing, protein isolation and purification, separation procedures, chromatography, and gel electrophoresis. Graduates of Biotechnology will find that their skills to be in demand in pharmaceutical/medical, environmental technology, and food enterprises which seek to create and improve various products and processes.

Business Administration

This instructional program is designed to prepare students to learn and work within various business and office/ administrative operations. Students will be train and take both Word and Excel (MOS) certification and Quickbook exams. Students will gain an understanding of the business/ office structure and how it relates to various types of business organizations, and students will begin to develop the skills needed to succeed as future employees in various office-related organizations. Instruction includes business communication, accounting, principles of business, economics, ethics, law, data entry, office procedures, accounting, record management and report preparation.

Carpentry

This instructional program prepares students to apply technical knowledge and skills to layout, fabricate, erect, install and repair structures and fixtures using hand and power tools. This program includes instruction in common systems of framing, construction materials, estimating, blueprint reading and finish carpentry techniques.

and bleaching; permanent waving; facials; manicuring; and hand and arm massaging. Bacteriology, anatomy, hygiene, sanitation, salon and product management, including record keeping and customer relations, is a focus of the curriculum. Students also receive instruction in providing services to chronically ill and special needs clients and explore potential careers in the Health Industry. To adequately prepare students for employment in the Hair & Beauty Industry, these programs adhere to all ethical and professional standards of the industry as mandated by the PA State Board of Cosmetology. Under the supervision of licensed and credentialed instructors, students participate in the actual operation of school-based salons and cater to real clients to gain the customer service and management skills required to become professionals in this exciting industry. In addition, students intern in salons to gain valuable on-the-job training and experience. Instruction is designed to qualify students for the PA State Board of Cosmetology licensing examination.

Dental Science instruction shall include content in dental materials, dental radiography, oral anatomy, histology, oral embryology, oral pathology and therapeutics. Clinical science should emphasize the principles and application of office management, chair-side assisting, dental emergencies and legal/ethical aspects of dental practice. Clinical practice is an integral part of the program designed to perfect students' competence in performing dental assisting functions.

There is a heavy emphasis on maintaining production lines and manufacturing systems for today's modern workplace.

custom tailoring and clothing maintenance. Students learn fashion merchandising and apparel retail management, along with knowledge of how to develop, analyze and implement sales strategies. Instruction covers retail buying practices, inventory control and cost control analysis. Throughout the program students are encouraged to challenge their creative artistic skills to design, produce and showcase their talents.

Film & Video Production

This instructional program introduces students to the art and science of Digital Film & Video Production. Using state-of-the-art digital technology, students will apply their knowledge to create quality media productions for cable and television broadcast, DVD, the web, corporate videobased communications and computer-based presentation technology. This program will enhance students' computer literacy and communications skills, as well as a personal portfolio in preparation for college, business and employment.

Students also consider food labeling and packaging materials, sensory evaluation of products, and cultural practices that are directly linked to the production and consumption of food products. Among the industries which graduates of this program would have access to are food technology and food products, nutrition/dietetics, quality assurance and inspections, and food marketing and procurement.

The program focuses on developing the creativity and software skills necessary to be competitive in the field of Graphic Design. Students also learn the principles, materials, and skills necessary to bring a design problem to a logical solution. During the course of their instruction, students concentrate on developing an understanding of design fundamentals. Using state-of-the-art digital technology, students participate in activities like the State Computer Fair and other competitions that give students the opportunity to apply these principles to a variety of design problems. Course coverage includes visual design concepts, color theory, drawing, typography, print production, advertising, corporate design, publications design, packaging design, website design and photography. Computer design skills are integrated into various subjects throughout the program.

Coursework will emphasize botany, soil science, entomology, and the importance of plants in our lives, but students will also have plenty of opportunities to "get their hands dirty," developing skills in basic gardening and grounds care, landscape design and construction, and greenhouse management. A background in Horticulture could lead to careers in plant breeding, genetic engineering, landscape design, farming, floral design, research, nursery production, education, food science, and landscape construction and management.

Students will be instructed in the use of storage space, inventory control and shipping and receiving practices; as well as the operation of equipment such as forklifts, conveyors, hand trucks, carts and other devices used to transport materials and/or supplies to various destinations. Students are taught the many types of documents used in logistics such as purchase orders, invoices, bills of lading, requisitions, quotations, etc. Students are also instructed in the areas freight rates and tariffs, freight classification rules, and freight rate analysis.

Medical/Clinical Assistant

The clinical aspects of the program provide instruction in examination room techniques, aseptic practices, infection control, care of equipment and supplies, CPR and first aid, laboratory orientation and the use of biomedical equipment. The curriculum includes planned courses in anatomy and physiology, universal precautions and OSHA regulations, medical terminology, medical law and ethics, psychology, communications, introduction to pharmacology, medical assisting skills and clinical practice.

Includes instruction in source determination, water distribution, waste removal, pressure adjustment, basic physics, technical mathematics, blueprint reading, pipe installation, pumps, brazing and soldering, plumbing inspection and applicable codes and standards.

Precision Machine Tool Technology

Emphasis is placed upon bench work and the operation of lathes, power saws, shapers, milling machines, grinders, drills and computer operated equipment (CNC/CIM). Instruction also includes the use of precision measuring instruments such as layout tools, micrometers and gauges; methods of machining and heat treatment of various metals; blueprint reading; and the layout of machine parts. Instruction prepares students to operate all types of hand and computer controlled machines.

Instruction includes social media, marketing management, and business technology with Microsoft and Google applications.

Solar Energy Technologies

"Bright Solar Futures" is a program that prepares students for career opportunities in the solar energy and energy efficiency industries. Students will begin by exploring the foundational concepts of renewable energy, energy efficiency and construction safety practices. Then, through a blend of classroom learning, hands-on training in a stateof- the-art lab, field trips, and presentations by professionals in the field, students will learn how to manage and design solar projects, and how to perform solar installations and related building work including weatherization and electrical work. Additionally, students will develop understandings of the evolution of the solar energy industry and component technologies, and the business and financial implications of energy efficiency and conservation so that they will have a full range of directions in which they may build their careers.

Students learn safety practices and types and uses of electrodes and welding rods; properties of metals; blueprint reading; electrical principles; welding symbols and mechanical drawing; use of equipment for testing welds by ultrasonic methods and destruction and hardness testing; use of manuals and specification charts; use of portable grinders and chemical baths for surface cleaning; positioning and clamping; and welding standards established by the American Welding Society, American Society of Mechanical Engineers and American Bureau of Ships.

21st Century Schools

The 21st Century Schools (21C) model consists of instructional and experiential designs aligned to prepare students for postsecondary readiness. These designs enable students to determine a career pathway upon entering high school, focused on work-based experiences, use of innovative technology modalities, mentoring, project-based learning, variation in assessment and application of learning, and courses aligned to graduation requirements, postsecondary employment, postsecondary education, or a combination thereof.

Moreover, this model integrates the mastery of content that allows students to consistently access high leverage critical thinking skills: synthesizing, evaluating, and producing. Students in the 21st Century Schools learn in a global classroom that expands beyond the four traditional walls. Through this side-by-side classroom and field experience, students are able to demonstrate their ability to articulate and apply what they are learning in the classroom to their specific career pathway(s). Additionally, leveraging coaching between the field and the classroom elevates the preparation that encourages student success. The combined exposure provides students with a four dimensional perspective, establishing a concrete foundation built through: (1) instruction, (2) awareness, (3) exposure, and (4) experience; and allows students to develop persistence and retention as related to career experiences.

We have identified three schools that will participate in the 21st Century Schools model: Bartram High School, West Philadelphia High School, and Overbrook High School. Each school will focus on an industry that is in high demand in the Philadelphia region and include but are not limited to:

- Transportation and Logistics (<u>Bartram HS</u>) including: Automotives (collision & repair), Supply Management/Logistician, Warehousing (*CDL), Transportation (air, rail, road).
- Urban Development (<u>West Phila HS</u>) including: Real Estate (residential, commercial, industrial, raw land, and special use), Information Technology (computer repair), Arts & Cultural Studies, Entrepreneurship.
- Entertainment (<u>Overbrook HS</u>) including: Digital Design, Film & Television, Music Industry, Entertainment Management.

Athletics

The Division of Athletics is responsible for the coordination and implementation of athletic programs for public and charter schools in The School District of Philadelphia, as well as compliance with state athletic association (PIAA) and federal guidelines (such as Gender Equity, Title IX).

Participation in athletic activity has been shown to lead to improvement in many areas, including attendance in school, academic success, health and well-being, self-esteem, connectedness to peers and to school, high standards of conduct and attitude, teamwork and sportsmanship.

For these reasons, all incoming ninth grade students should plan to participate in extracurricular activities, including Athletics. Students need to be aware that minimum Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association (PIAA) academic standards must be met to participate in Athletics and that there also are separate scholarship requirements that vary based on institution. Please check with your high school counselor and athletic director for more information. The Division of Athletics regularly visits high schools and presents NCAA compliance information.

PIAA requires that a Comprehensive Initial Pre-Participation Physical Examination (CIPPE) be completed on or after May 1 of each school year. For more information, please contact your school Athletic Director.

Our Approach: Parkway Center City Middle College (PCCMC) in partnership with Community College of Philadelphia (CCP), requires that all scholars participate in a college level summer bridge course before entering Parkway in the 10th grade fall semester. During years one and two, scholars are engaged in rigorous course content at both sites (PCCMC and CCP) that is reflective of college level courses with encouragement and support from the entire school community including CCP. In Year three and four, scholars will be immersed in college level courses at CCP leading to multiple pathways such as obtaining an Associate degree in Liberal Arts, earning a minimum of 48 college credits, or Industry certifications in Computer Program or Entrepreneurship. Our staff supports a culture of high expectations for teaching and learning. Scholars are engaged, encouraged, and empowered to graduate successfully from PCCMC with a High School diploma and an Associate's Degree (CCP). Furthermore, our vision is that scholars will continue college to earn a Bachelor's Degree and /or complete successful career options. Our parents, families and quardians are full partners in fostering academic achievement, personal responsibility, and self-actualization. We encourage our scholars to develop entrepreneurial attitudes, peer leadership and community service to prepare for their future as members of the global economy and citizens of the world.

The uniqueness of the Middle College program provides students the opportu-

nity to complete their high school years with a high school diploma and an Associate's Degree. In order to accomplish this, students will be fully matriculated into CCP for their Junior and Senior years. In order to begin Junior and Senior year at CCP, students are expected to be performing at college level in both Math and English and will be administered a placement test. The placement test is a requirement from CCP for all students attending the college. By the end of Sophomore year, if students do not place at college level they will not be able to continue their years at PCCMC as there will not be any Junior or Senior classes held at the high school level.

Vaux Big Picture High School (BPHS) will foster a culture where all stakeholders, regardless of race, ethnicity, sexual orientation or socioeconomic attainment, value each other and work together toward an interdependent, safe, and nurturing community.

Vaux BPHS opened its doors in September 2017 to welcome the first Graduating Class of 2021! Vaux BPHS is part of the Big Picture Learning network, which successfully serves youth in more than 70 schools nationwide.

Core approaches of Vaux High School:

Advisory: Every student will join an Advisory upon enrolling at Vaux BPHS. Advisories are small communities within the school that students remain with until graduation. Advisories are valuable support systems helping students develop close relationships with the advisor and their peers.

Exhibitions: At the end of each semester, instead of taking midterm or final exams, all students present an exhibition of their work and learning. Mission & Approach to Learning:

The International Baccalaureate (IB) is a comprehensive two-year curriculum which promotes student autonomy, independent research, and a rich, postmodern educational environment. In the ninth and tenth grade students will have a full roster of advanced and honors classes so that they will be adequately prepared for the expectations of the Diploma Program years. To earn an IB diploma, students must take a challenging liberal arts course of studies and pass examinations in six academic subjects:

- IB Language A: Literature HL1 and HL2
- IB Mathematics SL and SL2
- IB Chemistry SL
- IB Physics SL and SL2
- IB History HL1 and HL2
- IB Psychology HL1 and HL2
- IB Language B: Spanish SL and SL2
- IB Language B: Russian SL and SL2

In addition, students are required to take the Theory of Knowledge (TOK) course that investigates the nature of knowledge in various disciplines; participate in Creativity, Action, Service (CAS) to achieve eight learning outcomes, undertake original research, and write an Extended Essav of 4,000 words. Students successfully completing the program earn a George Washington High School diploma in addition to the internationally recognized IB diploma. Students who complete this program are more likely to move on to prestigious universities and colleges.

Based in the heart of Philadelphia, The Workshop School is a project-based high school that prioritizes educating the whole student. Workshop takes a project-based approach to learning, allowing students to gain knowledge and hands-on experience through a variety of immersive projects, internships, entrepreneurship, and dual enrollment in college courses. We focus 11th and 12th grade student projects on the transition to college or career.

Workshop is committed to developing students' vision, know-how, and mindset for a successful adulthood. Developing your vision means knowing who you are and what you want from life. Developing know-how means you have the skills to pursue your vision. Mindset is knowing you can get there, even when you don't know exactly how you'll do it; and when we say a successful adulthood, we're talking about a life of security, connection, and purpose. 
